National Executive Board Meeting -Youngstown, Ohio

On May 16, 2009 the Senior and Junior National Executive Boards met in Youngstown, Ohio. The morning started with morning prayers led by Fr.

Harvey, John Spiritual Advisor for Youngstown the Senior and Junior UOL Chapters. Following a hearty breakfast prepared by the Youngstown chapter the Board convened their meetings.

Financial reports indicated that over \$1800 was collected



for the Thanksgiving Tithing Project which will be donated to the St. Anthony of the Desert Mission Parish in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Additionally, to date we have collected over \$3000 for Souper Bowl Sunday. The donations from the Souper Bowl Sunday are given to St. Andrew's Society Soup Kitchens. If you chapter has not submitted your donation please be sure to submit them as soon as possible.

A discussion was held about how to communicate more frequently and easily with chapters regarding reminders for deadlines and distribution of materials. The election report form does include e-mail addresses. However, often chapters do not complete that information. If your officers do have e-mail addresses, please be sure to include them on election roster forms as this will assist in distributing of material and can be a major money saver for postage, particularly in the sending of minutes.

Shirley Skocypec reported that UOL Essay Contest information was distributed to all parishes of the UOC. She is hopeful that we will have participants from our UOL chapters as well as from other parishes.

A brief discussion was held regarding the Lenten Retreats. This year both retreats had slightly lower attendance. For the Bethlehem Retreat it was decided to reserve the retreat center for one day only as weekend attendance at the retreat has decreased and individuals have mostly been day participants. The retreat has a core group that attends annually. For the All Saints Camp Retreat, next year Pascha falls in early spring therefore, the Camp can not

ASK FR. HARVEY RELIGIOUS QUESTIONS

Answered by: Fr. John Harvey

Recently, I have noticed that when approaching any clergy, individuals are asking for a blessing from the priest. I was taught that we ask for blessings from bishops and hierarchs. What is the proper way to greet clergy?

As our Orthodox world is getting closer, habits which until now have been more common with other jurisdictions and traditions are now starting to influence ours. As a general rule, whenever a hierarch is present, a blessing is NEVER sought from a priest. The hierarch or hierarchs are the spiritual authority present, with the priests serving subservient or complimentary roles. You will note that at the beginning of a hierarchal liturgy, as priests are bid to enter the altar to serve an ektenia, they first must get the blessing from all hierarchs who are serving.

Unique in the Orthodox world, the Ukrainian Orthodox custom of greeting a priest is by saying Slava Isusu Christu! or its equivalent in English. This is most pronounced in Western Ukraine and the Trans-Carpathian regions, with such common usage fading the farther east one goes. Our younger generations, if not constantly reminded, do not automatically come out with this common and pious greeting like our babas always have done. This is a sad consequence of modern life in which our dealings with one another are always informal and familiar. Western Europe has a regional custom, which is about the same. Bavaria and parts of Austria have the greeting "Gruess Gott", Greet God ! This greeting almost fanatically asserts their difference from other Germanic regions, but in the present decade secularist trends, battling against this wholesome custom, have made inroads.

Our seminarians from Ukraine always ask blessings from priests upon meeting them, so this practice may be on the rise in that part of Europe. People here in America, who have been under the influence of monasteries, especially Greek monasteries and convents, do the same and this is becoming more common. When I telephone the O.C.M.C. headquarters, the receptionist always begins by saying "Your blessing father please" when a priest is perceived to be on the other end of the line. This was new to me, and now I usually say in return, "May the Lord Jesus bless all of us." This sort of greeting I find increasingly more common and I am adjusting to it.

In Orthodox churches throughout the world, it is most common to kiss the priest's hand when coming forward to kiss the cross. This universally observed

custom is conspicuously absent in the majority of our parishes here. There can be several explanations for this phenomenon. The church in Ukraine in 1921 adopted many reform ideas that had been floating around the Russian Empire since the turn of the century. Some of these were of a very egalitarian spirit, and so we see monks of the time incongruously wearing business suits instead of the normal monastic garb. In that sort of atmosphere, the bowing, kowtowing and kissing of hands of priests must have taken a negative meaning.

Wasn't it also that peasants and serfs had, until the revolution, to bow and kiss the hands of the "Pan," the local master and landowner, who lived in the manor house? Times change and the virulently negative associations tied to bowing, asking a blessing, or kissing the hand of a priest have evaporated. Here in America many of our priests preferred the egalitarian approach and the kissing of hands was not considered modern or in the American mode of things. Over the years I have seen embarrassed priests jerking their hand away with the blessing cross whenever someone tried to kiss it.

We are entering a new era, so what is acceptable? Upon greeting a priest, the greeting "Glory be to Jesus Christ" is most appropriate.

Asking his blessing and kissing his hand is proper under certain circumstances and understandable, but in our tradition it seems rather forced and unnatural.

Many priests, who have not seen this before, may find this startling and may react in an awkward manner to such an approach. The kissing of a priest's hand when coming to kiss the cross, again is of almost universal occurrence, so priests should not be shocked, especially now as we find ourselves often in pan-Orthodox situations. Regarding this, do what feels comfortable to you and our priests should be adaptable. One note, that is important. When a hierarch, or priest enters the room, it should be common courtesy to acknowledge the entrance and usually even to stand.

Asking a blessing, kissing the hand that blesses or courtesy surrounding the entrance of a priest or bishop should be put into the right context. We are not kowtowing to an important personage, but the hand that prays for us and gives us the blessing of God should have some due reverence. Rather than being an arrogance or some power trip, the priest should be humble enough to dispense blessings in a true pastoral spirit, realizing that despite his own faults and weaknesses, he is the instrument of God's pastoral and provident grace.

Vocations and Clergy Support Corner

Submitted by Pani Matka Linda Oryhon "Few Are Called... Are You Next?"

Nothing we can expect of our clergy can compare to the awesome responsibilities placed on them at ordination. The Holy Sacrament of Ordination sets these men apart to serve God's purpose. Their humanity remains intact as they proclaim the mystery of God's salvation. However the Holy Sacrament does not turn them into perfect angels. This is explained in St. Paul's Epistle to the Hebrews 4:14-16; 5:1-6. "For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. Because of this he is bound to offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not take the honor upon himself, but he is called by God, just as Aaron was. So also Christ did not exalt himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by him who said to him 'Thou art my Son, today I have begotten thee'."

The priest is that earthly link to help guide us toward our salvation as well as his own. His sins and weaknesses should not draw our attention away from Christ. As is profoundly stated during the celebration of the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom when the priest prays the following words: "Accept also the prayer of us sinners and bear it to thy holy altar enabling us to offer unto Thee gifts and spiritual sacrifices for our sins and the errors of the people." This theme is expressed in Fr. Anthony Coniaris' book entitled *These Are The Sacraments*, as he quotes Karl Rahner (*Meditations on the Sacraments*), "...men are offended when someone appears to do God's business and is still only a man. They want messengers who speak more brilliantly, heralds who preach more persuasively, hearts that burn with a hotter flame. Blessed will you be then, those of you who have not been scandalized at the man in the priest. He is so human so that you can believe that man-poor, real man-can possess the grace of God."

How then can we begin to better understand our relationship with our spiritual fathers? Rahner advises in his article *The Priesthood*, "...Accept us as messengers of Christ. Let your hearts and minds swell with the grace of God so as to hear in our human words, in our fumbling, miserable, colorless and often repetitious words, the holy, blessed and powerful word of God, the word that brings God Himself and His eternal life into our midst... if, looking always through and beyond us, you set your gaze upon the Lord, then you will take from our words the comfort, the power and the eternal life that comes to you in the Word of God."

This humanity and humility is illustrated in the priest's private prayers during the Divine Liturgy. As he prays, "...Look down upon me, a sinner, thy unprofitable servant, and cleanse my soul and my heart from an evil conscience; and by the power of the Holy Spirit enable me, who am endowed with the grace of the priesthood, to stand before this, thy holy table, and perform the sacred mystery of Thy holy and pure Body and precious Blood..."

Fr. Coniaris uses an appropriate analogy in clarifying our relationship with our priest. He likens the role of the priest to the coach of a team. His responsibility is to discover, encourage, and cultivate the talents of his team. The true task of the priest is to train his people of God that they should go out into their community and the world and show their love of God and his people. We should embrace the true team given to us- the Church through her clergy. Only then can we continue to grow in God's unapproachable glory.


